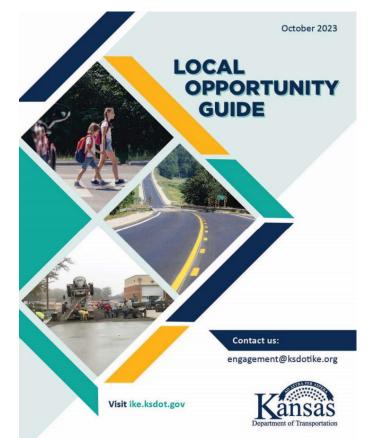

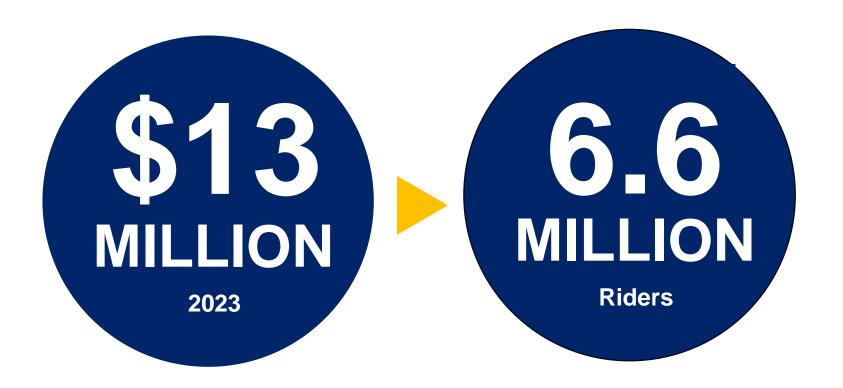
Kansans aged 15-64 do not have a driver's license

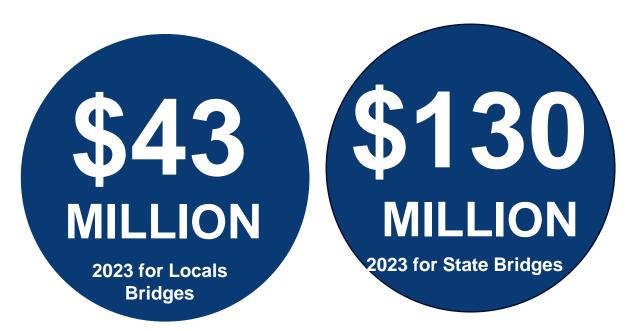

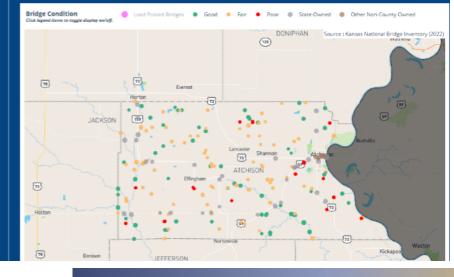

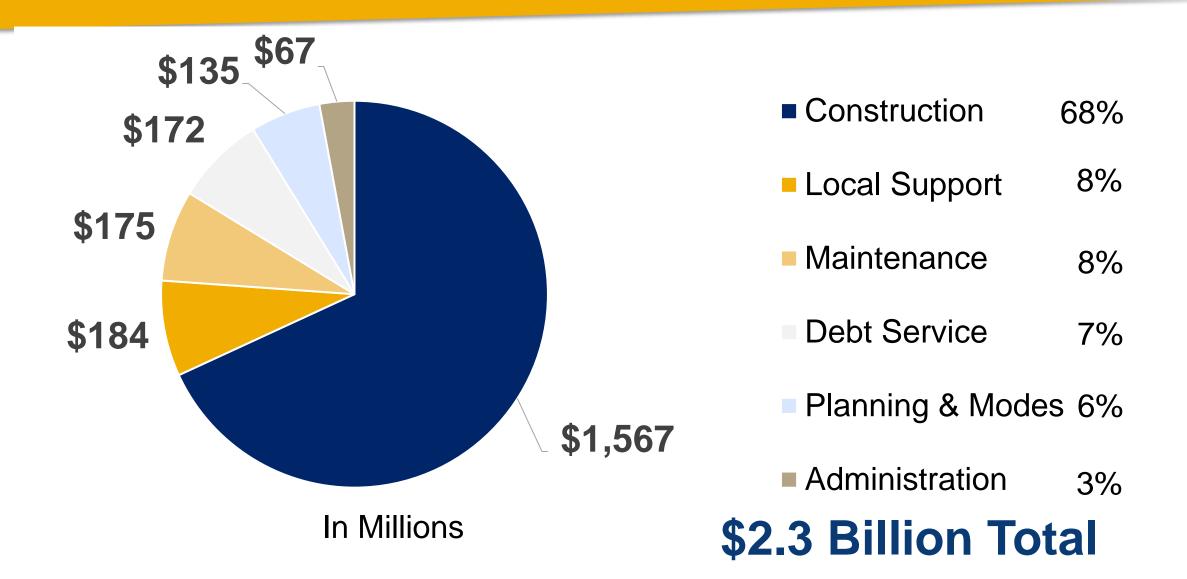
FY2025 Revenue Sources | All Funds



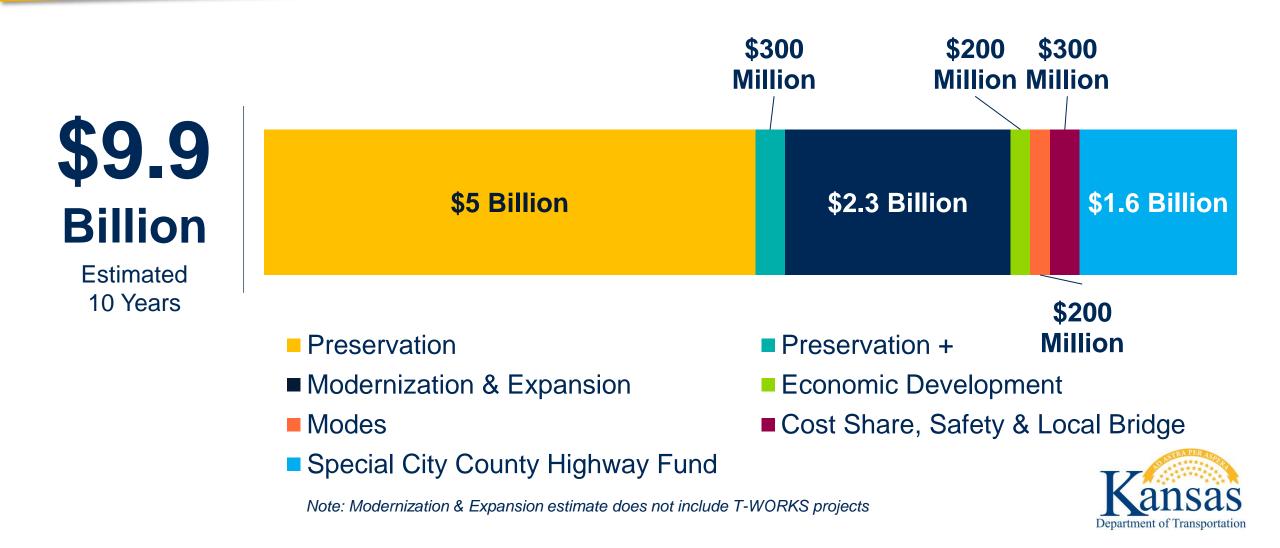

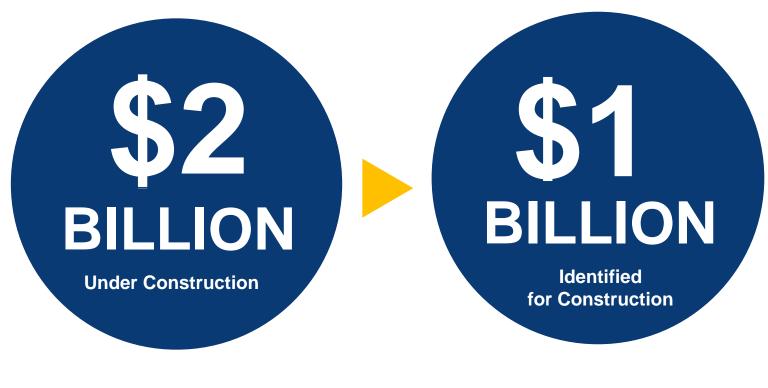

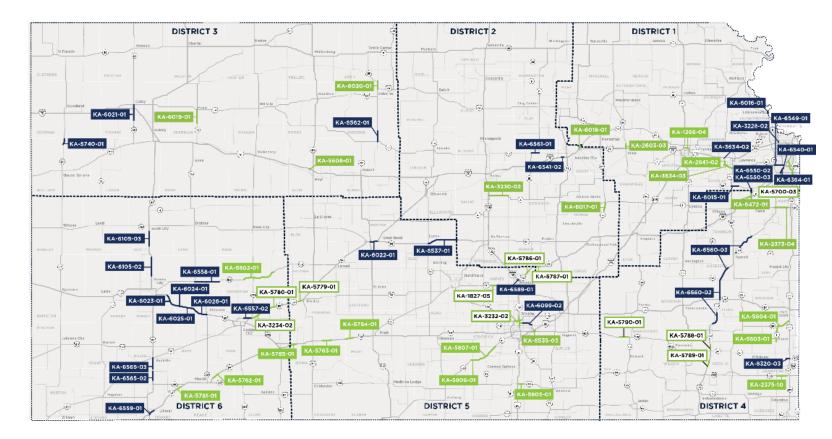
